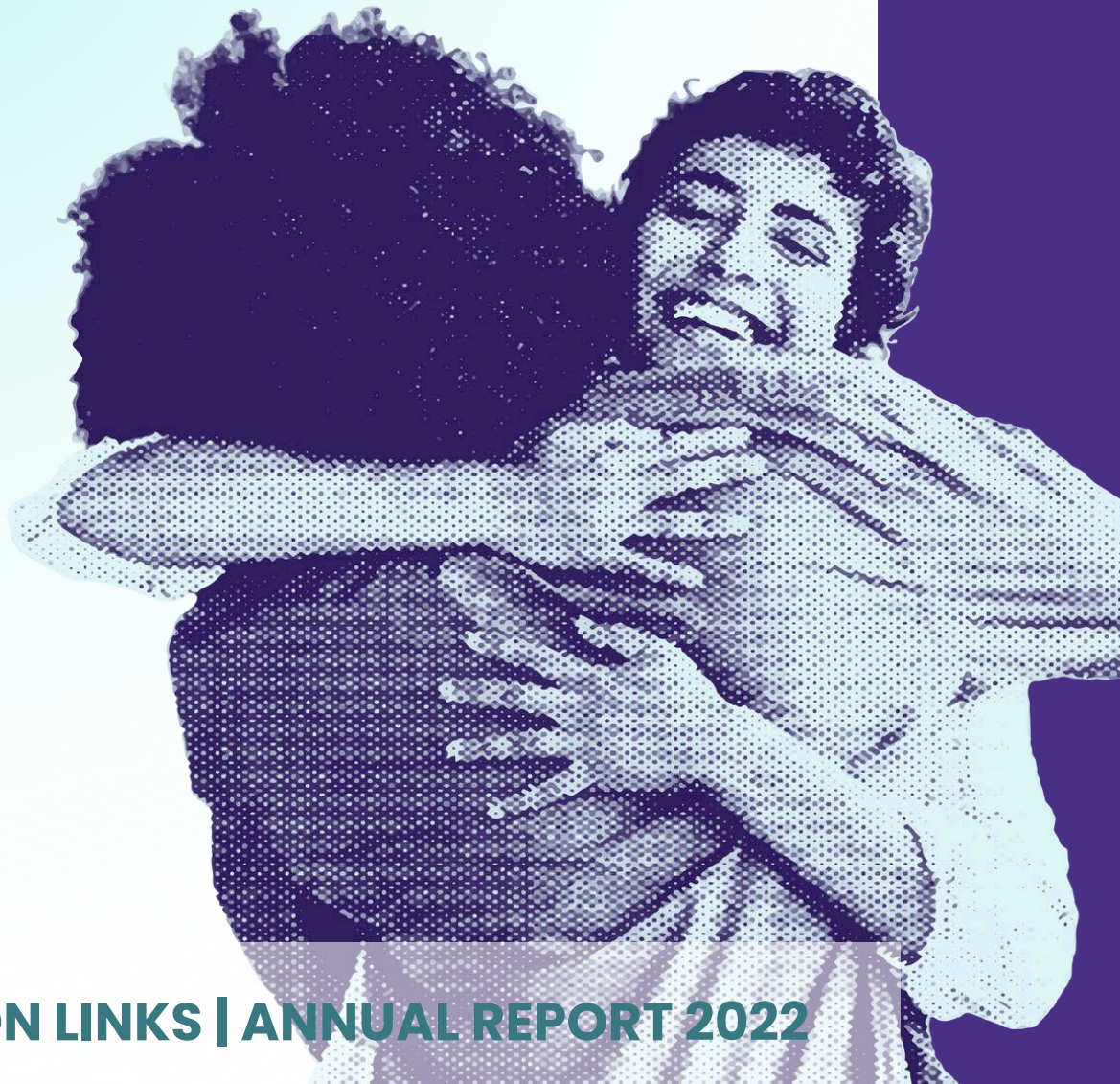

It is my honor and privilege to present our 2022 Annual Impact Report. After being so isolated during the pandemic, I believe I can speak for all of us when I say that these times have provided a renewed appreciation for the critical importance of community and connection. As the grasp of COVID-19 began to loosen, it was clear that meeting the needs of the community would require our agency to bravely pivot into uncharted waters. In 2022, Prevention Links was prepared to guide our communities to a path of resilience.

We had the privilege of continuing to expand our programs and services, in partnership with local communities, to create opportunity for greater connection to resources and support.

The Vision of Hope Recovery Center opened in New Brunswick, creating a safe space and hub for the Middlesex County recovery community.

All this in addition to the continued work of our existing Family Success Centers, Recovery Community Centers, Coalitions, and other vital programs that **impact more than 10,000 people each year.**

At Prevention Links, we leverage the strengths of our communities to empower individuals and families in leading their best & healthiest lives. *Every day, we build links to brighter futures.*

Our hands-on approach to prevention has put us on the frontlines of the crises following the pandemic. Tragically, we have witnessed the unprecedented rates of overdose, suicide deaths, and mental health issues skyrocketing locally and throughout the country.

The need for our services is greater than ever, and yet so many families who need us *still don't know we are here.* **In the coming year, we are committed to making Prevention Links a household name in the counties we serve.** We look forward to expanding our Harm Reduction services, school-based prevention education, state-wide recovery support, and youth clinical mental health services.

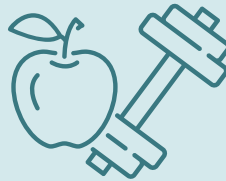

By preventing crisis, neglect, or abuse before it can ever begin, we raise children who feel loved, supported, and inspired to make a positive change in the world. This is a shared responsibility with society which we are immensely grateful to be a part of.

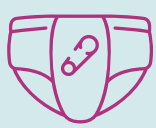

Recovery Services

More than 140,000 people die from excessive alcohol use in the U.S. each year, and in 2021 alone, 106,699 people lost their lives to a drug overdose. (CDC) These devastating statistics are one of the many reasons our slogan, "everyone knows someone, help prevent the next one" rings true.

These numbers do not discourage us, but fuel us to expand our recovery services – to make sure no family or loved one has to lose someone to addiction or face it alone.

We are grateful to offer families and individuals hope, healing, opportunity & community. Whether that be a guide to treatment, job coaching session, referral to a community resource, mutual aid meeting, family support session, recovery event or simply a listening ear – we are there each step of the way.

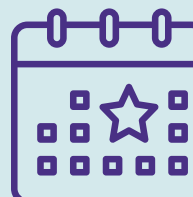

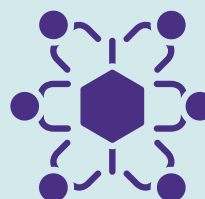

OUR STORY

The story of how Prevention Links came to be is just one small part of a much larger addiction prevention & recovery movement that happened, and is still happening, in our country.

Over 70 years ago, Marty Mann, the first woman to achieve sobriety in Alcoholics Anonymous, knew that “stigma would be our greatest foe.” What she didn’t know is that her public stance addressing the addiction crisis in the United States would eventually lead to the founding of our organization:

Prevention Links.

Marty was born into a life of wealth and privilege in Chicago in the early 1900s. As a charismatic young woman with plenty of connections, she launched a career in the world of public relations working as an art critic, magazine editor, and photojournalist for renowned magazines such as Vogue, Harpers, and Tattler.

Within 10 years, both Marty’s career and relationships had withered away in the face of a crippling addiction to alcohol. Two suicide attempts nearly killed her, and desperate drinking threatened to finish the job. Homeless abroad in London with nothing left to lose, she returned to the U.S. in 1936 to seek help.

Marty became a patient at Blythewood psychiatric inpatient center where she spent months unsuccessfully attempting to achieve recovery under medical care, until a doctor’s last ditch effort to help changed her life forever: in 1939, Marty was given a manuscript of “Alcoholics Anonymous” to read, provided by her doctor Harry Tiebout.

When Marty read the first chapters, she had a profound realization:

“I wasn’t the only person in the world who felt and behaved like this! I wasn’t mad or vicious...I was suffering from an actual disease that had a name and symptoms like diabetes or cancer or TB – and a disease was respectable, not a moral stigma.”

This one-time debutante and successful business woman, turned unfulfilled and sick with alcoholism, began her journey into addiction recovery. Marty became one of the first-ever women to successfully achieve sobriety in Alcoholics Anonymous, and subsequently brought her passion for recovery far beyond the walls of the 12-step meeting room.

From societal stigma to blatant misinformation, Marty soon discovered that there were many misunderstandings about addiction which kept people from getting help. This disappointing revelation was the spark which led to her declaration of war on the social stigma attached to addiction. In 1944, Marty established what's now known as the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD), an organization started to serve a dual purpose:

First, to have a proactive national education and advocacy program attacking the stigma and misunderstanding about addiction, treatment and recovery;

Second, to operate service centers in communities across the country staffed by professionals helping individuals and families with addiction problems (*sound familiar?*).

Eventually, NCADD affiliate offices were brought to New Jersey, one of which was opened in none other than Union County's town of Westfield. Later becoming known as Prevention Links, our agency has stayed true to the model created by Marty Mann while building towards a brighter future:

1. Helping people find help.
2. Reducing stigma by educating the community about addiction.
3. Reducing the number of people that use substances and preventing addiction through education and awareness.
4. Enhancing services in a meaningful and person-centered way.

In 1971...

Prevention Links was officially established. In our over 50 year history, our agency has had only five Executive Directors: Theresa Mahgeary, Gladys Kearns, Diane Litterer, Pamela Capaci and Morgan Thompson. **And in the tradition of Marty Mann, our agency has stayed focused on our mission through the strong leadership these great women.**

In 1981...

we were almost 100% volunteer managed and operated.

In 1996...

the agency budget was \$150,000 per year with 2 employees and \$50,000 of debt.

In 2022...

our budget is nearly 6 million dollars with 100+ employees and 9, soon to be 10 locations, serving tens of thousands of residents in five counties.

Today we remain true to our founding principles:

We've always been helping people find help;

We've always been advocates for prevention & recovery;

We've always believed in the resilience of families;

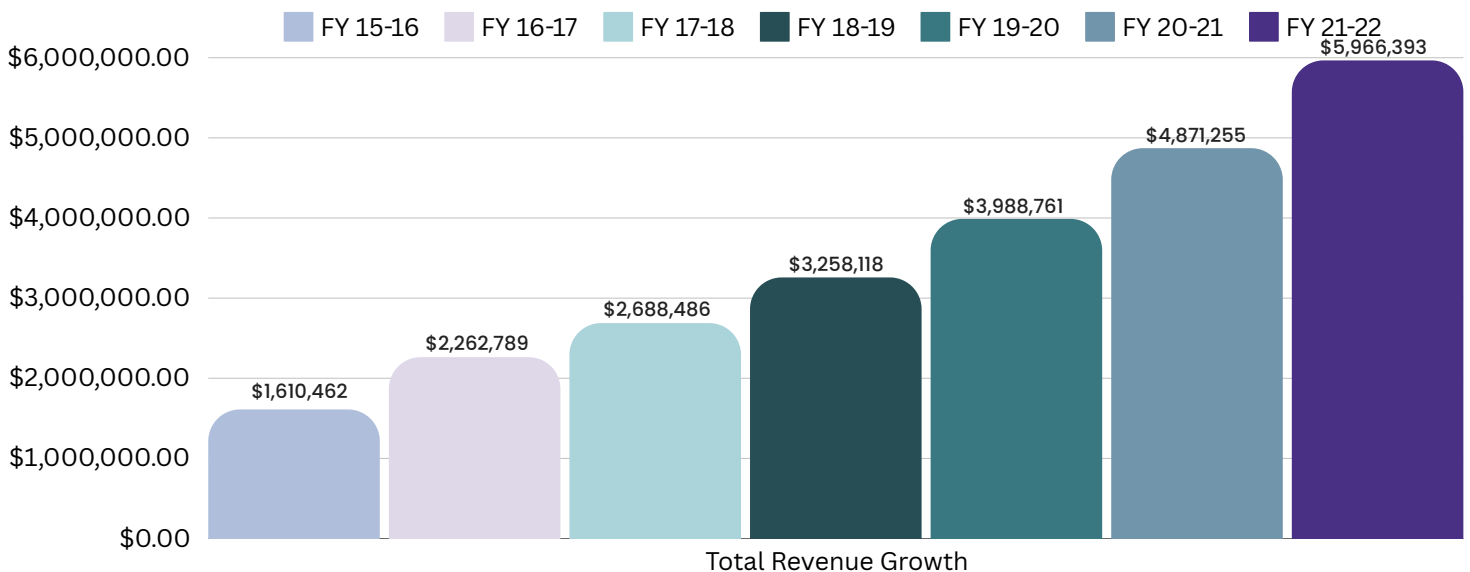
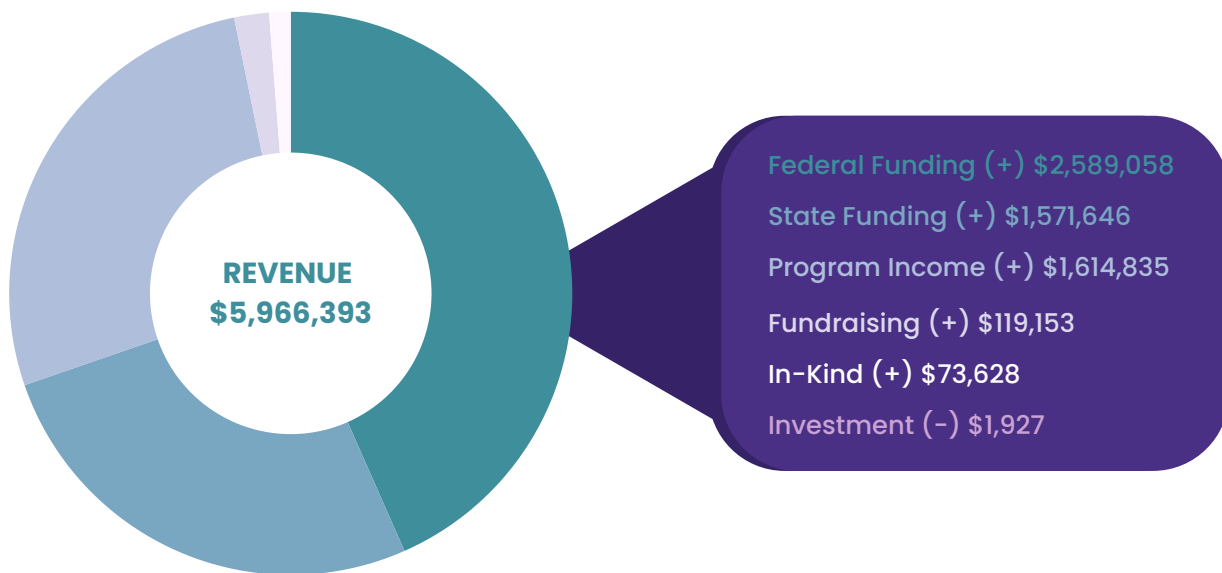

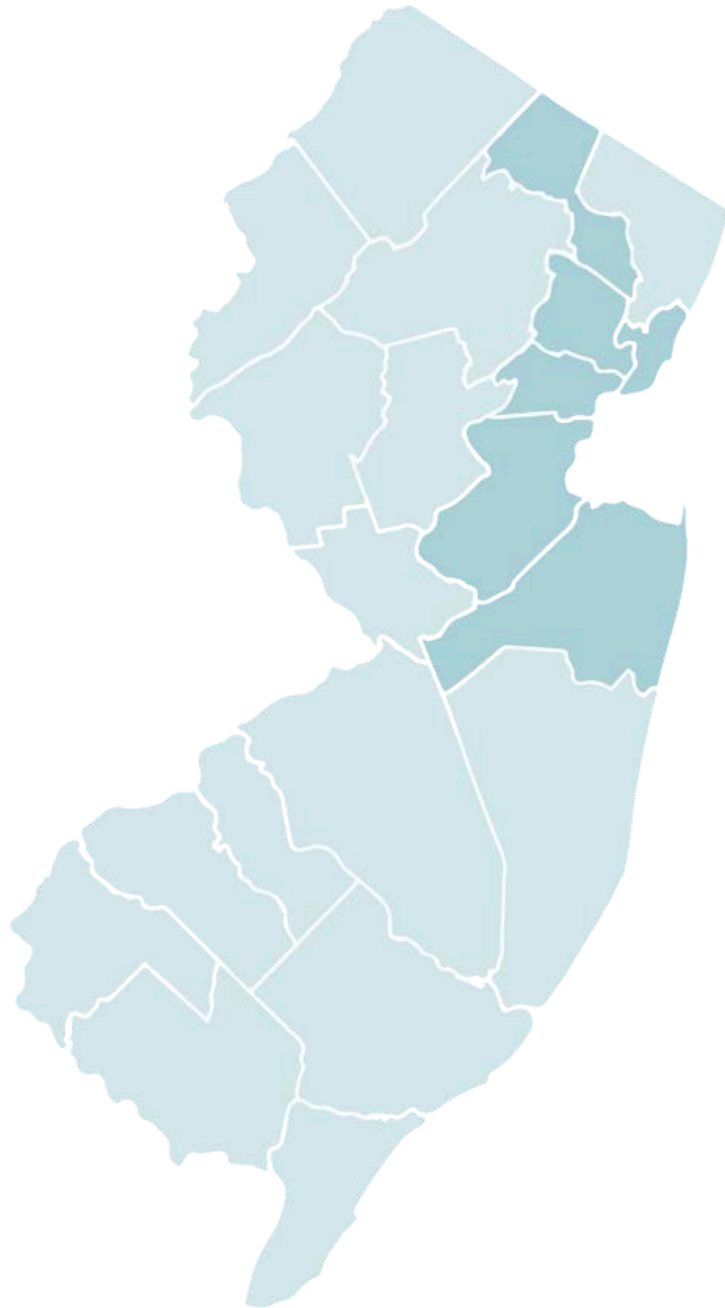
FINANCIALS \$

FY July 1st, 2021–June 30, 2022

Our total revenue was nearly \$6M in FY 2021–2022, up 26% over the previous fiscal year— our second consecutive year posting revenue growth of 25% or more. With a 90% increase in our fundraising revenue from FY 20–21 to FY 21–22, our fundraising growth trends remain strong moving into FY 22–23.

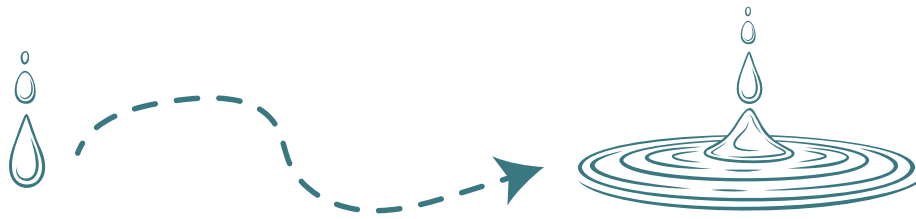

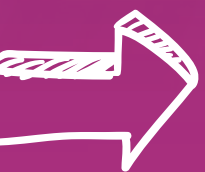

Jack Harris Memorial Fund

In October of 2022, we received a call from Amy, a mother from Union County who had recently lost her son Jack to a heroin overdose. She expressed a desire to start a memorial fund in her son's memory with our organization, so we invited her to come speak with us in person.

What Amy described to us was a story too many of us at Prevention Links are familiar with.

Jack was a kind, sensitive young man with an effervescent smile. Jack loved animals and his family. He was curious, delving into any topic he found interesting to gain deeper insight. His family loved him and was always on his team, no matter what. What this tells us is that even the most brilliant people - who have the support to thrive - can still fall prey to addiction.

Jack had made numerous, earnest attempts to recover from his addiction to opiates. From detox, to residential treatment, to mutual aid meetings, to medicated assisted treatment, Jack was still met with a struggle many of us know (but don't always talk about) - feeling like there is no way out.

The truth is that Jack was in recovery for two years before his death. All it took was one time of use to

take his life because of an increasingly lethal drug supply of fentanyl. This is why prevention education is a crucial and life-giving resource we provide and advocate for in our communities.

It takes immense courage to shine light where it hurts the most. We are beyond grateful that Amy and her family chose Prevention Links as the conduit to honor Jack's legacy. *From the bottom of our hearts, we thank you for trusting us and believing in our mission.*

Lastly, thank you to all of the families who generously donated to Jack's Fund, which has amounted to nearly \$9,000 - your compassion provides hope where it's needed the most.

We are heartbroken that we didn't get the chance to meet Jack and provide him with the much-needed community that he was seeking. With these funds, we are determined to provide others like him with the opportunity, support, and sense of belonging needed to persevere.

Because we believe - beyond a shadow of a doubt - that recovery is possible.
